- Carry out Animal Assisted Interventions and Activities alongside partnered health and social care professionals.
- Provide training and advice to people to develop a relationship and strong bond with a pet dog, to ease specific challenges.
- Support with training and placement of assistance dogs (current dogs located in North of Scotland).

Ideally we are looking for someone in the Inverclyde area, but will consider applications from candidates within a reasonable commuting distance (60mins) for this role.

Job Responsibilities

- 1. Prepare and conduct AAI sessions with clients; including client profiling, goal setting, risk assessment, session plan development, record keeping and review/evaluation.
- 2. Prepare and conduct AAA sessions with groups; including risk assessment, session plan development, record keeping and review/evaluation.
- 3. Ongoing education of a community dog for specific exercises and skills.
- 4. Develop skills to place a small number of Assistance Dogs and play an active role in the delivery of the Assistance Dog service including support in the following aspects: identifying suitable dogs, matching with clients, education and placing dogs and ongoing aftercare.
- 5. Liaise and network with other organisations and healthcare professionals to promote Dogs for Good services.
- 6. Liaise and work with volunteers to deliver AAA in the local community.
- 7. To ensure accurate and timely record keeping to demonstrate the impact of the services.
- 8. Keep abreast of developments in the field of AAI and relevant client conditions, which may inform the progress and growth of the Community Dog service.
- 9. Share best practice with, and take opportunities to learn from, other practitioners in the Dogs for Good network.
- 10. Participate in and support programmes of evaluation/research conducted by Dogs for Good and our partners. This will include ensuring that relevant data about work with clients is collected and maintained, in line with the Dogs for Good Data Protection policy and protocols agreed with our partner organisations.
- 11. To support the charity's marketing team, public relations and fundraising functions by carrying out talks, demonstrations and as required.
- 12. To attend regular 121 meetings and appraisal reviews as part of a program for personal development.
- 13. To monitor and, where appropriate, take steps to safeguard charity clients, vulnerable children and adults engaged within the service area as per policy.
- 14. To carry out any other tasks agreed with your line manager.

- The jobholder will be required to work to Dogs for Good's standards of Animal Assisted Intervention, which embrace the standards of Animal Assisted Intervention International (AAII).
- You are expected to have a good understanding of safeguarding issues and how they should be applied to the work of the charity and its partner organisations.
- Flexible working hours will be required in some instances to facilitate the effective delivery of services.
- You may occasionally be required to work and stay away from home for short periods of time.
- The Community Dog Handler may be required to accommodate a Community Dog in their home.
